3. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING HELD 5 DECEMBER 2008:

Moved Charles Lucas, seconded Arthur Haworth and carried that the minutes of the previous meeting of the Westland District Safer Community Council be confirmed as a true and correct record and signed by the chairperson.

4. MATTERS ARISING:

4.1 The Coordinator has not submitted an article on the SCC to The Guardian.

4.2 If the proposal for CCTV at Franz Josef Glacier goes ahead, then leasing would seem to be the most practical option.

5. INWARD & OUTWARD CORRESPONDENCE:

Total Mobility Scheme: Moved Councillor Kyle Scott, seconded Frances Stapleton and carried that the Coordinator write to the Hon John Carter, the Hon Judith Collins, the West Coast Regional Council, Chris Auchinvole, Kevin Hague and the Minister of Social Development, requesting that the present Certificate of Eligibility for the Total Mobility Scheme be modified to include a section for those people who do not meet the strict criteria but have given up their driver's licence voluntarily (often because they have lost confidence) and are therefore disadvantaged and need to be able to use taxi chits because there is no public transport on the coast.

Moved Adair Quaife, seconded Frances Stapleton and carried that the inward correspondence be received and the outward correspondence be endorsed.

6. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS:

It was noted that there was no Income shown on the SCC financial Statement.

Moved Charles Lucas, seconded Jan Zuckerman and carried that the financial statements be adopted.

7. GENERAL BUSINESS:

7.1 Allan McCrae presented a CY&F presentation on Youth Offending and Youth Justice. Christine McKenna to follow this up with the Coordinator.

7.2 Police Report from Community Constable Mark Watson:
"The Hokitika Police have been disappointed by the number of people drink driving. For the period 1st December 2008 till the 31st of January 2009, 12 drivers were apprehended and charged with driving with excess breath alcohol. Of these, 4 have been caught before.

The general feeling amongst local Police staff is that disorder related offences during the festive season were lower than previous years and there has been a high level of compliance and acceptance of the alcohol ban with 7 warnings being issued in December and January and no arrests.

The new Franz Josef Police Station is open and the vacancy for the second officer has been filled with Constable Bill Parker being appointed as Officer in Charge. Bill is a very experienced Constable who is currently stationed in Greymouth. His start date at Franz is yet to be determined."

Moved Jan Zuckerman, seconded Jan Weaver and carried that the Coordinator write a letter to the Planning Committee in support of retaining the liquor ban in its present area, stating that it has community support and has been effective in its operation.

3. **Strengthening Families meetings:** Currently working with 1 local family.
4. **Turnaround Programme:** No cases since the last meeting. .
5. **Pride of Place Judging:** 14 local businesses were judged in the second week of December on the following criteria:
 - a. attractive, tidy and clean front entrance
 - b. street verandah provided

- c. adequate under verandah street lighting or lit up window display
- d. elimination of problematic alleys with adjoining businesses
- e. pruning of nearby overgrown shrubs and trees
- f. tidy clean rear service yard
- g. any known contribution to local community safety

The winning entry went to Fine Art Photography & Gallery and second place to TP Goldsmiths. Certificates and prizes were presented at the January meeting of the District Council.

One of the benefits of this award has been that I have been able to discuss with three local businesses the problems caused by alleyways/overgrown vegetation adjacent to them and ask them to rectify some long standing issues.

There has also been some suggestions that this competition be held at another time of the year and that we run a competition for the shop window with the best Christmas theme.

6. **Awatuna Parenting Programmes Trust:** CY&F asked for a comprehensive breakdown of budget costs so that they can re-assess the level of funding they grant for local parenting programmes. CY&F have also completed their review of approval status for the programme.
7. **Interagency Alcohol Strategy Advisory Group Meeting:** Further progress was made on this strategy with a suggestion from ALAC that meaningful data be collected from a variety of local sources to determine the effectiveness of measures already in place to deal with alcohol abuse. Yesterday I attended a Crime Prevention Unit workshop in Christchurch which covered alcohol and community safety and local strategies to reduce alcohol-related harm.
8. **Ministry of Youth Development Partnership Fund:** I am working on an application for this to go in the fifth round.
9. **CACTUS:** Started Monday February 9th at Bodyworx Gym Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays 6:45am-7:45am. Showers and Porridge provided afterwards. Information is available on the CACTUS blogspot: www.cactushoki.blogspot.com/

Your Worship the Mayor and District Councillors

Please find attached the final form of the Hokitika Alcohol Strategy. At this point in time, the Interagency Alcohol Strategy Advisory Group has gone as far as progress will allow in developing this strategy.

Background to the Strategy:

In June 2006, the Ministry of Justice, through the Crime Prevention Unit, offered a one off grant to the Westland District Safer Community Council for an initiative aimed at reducing alcohol related violence. The primary objective of the initiative was to

- Reduce the incidence of violence where the perpetrator and/or victims are affected by alcohol.
- Improve local responses to alcohol-related violence.
- Increase the safety of environments where alcohol consumption occurs.

In August 2006, the Council received the grant to establish an interagency alcohol strategy advisory group made up of representatives from the District Council, Police, Community and Public Health, ALAC, local hoteliers, Rata Te Awhina Trust, New World and Westland High School. A number of meetings were held to discuss alcohol related issues and concerns in the community. At ALAC's recommendation, a consultant was employed in 2007, using some of the grant money, to interview key people in the community with the object of putting together a strategy which you have before you today.

The strategy covers key priority areas about who will lead, when and what resources are available to put into this area. This required a response from the whole community and in particular from the groups of people who made up the advisory group. Some of these priority areas are very clear, others are going to take some work over the coming 2-3 years. Hence this is not a completed document but one in the process of formation and the intention of the group is to continue to meet every six months to make further additions/alterations to the strategy. We will also need to take into account that the Law Commission is currently reviewing liquor laws and is considering issues such as the proliferation of liquor outlets and how alcohol consumption contributes to criminal offending.

Recommendation:

That Council adopt the strategy in its present form.

Foreword from Maureen Pugh – Mayor, Westland District

With the growing community concern over the needless vandalism and violence occurring in the central business district of Hokitika and spreading into the residential areas, it was seen as a proactive approach by Council to address the issue of alcohol use, abuse and availability, and the subsequent negative consequences arising from it.

Council has, in developing and implementing this strategy, achieved the following Community Outcomes:

HEALTH - Healthy communities with access to quality facilities and services:

SAFETY - A District that is a safe place to live:

IDENTITY - A happening region with a strong community spirit and distinctive lifestyle.

A grant was successfully applied for from the Crime Prevention Unit to contract a consultant to undertake this strategy. This document is the result of many hours of discussion with the key stakeholder groups and individuals who were identified very early in the work and who have participated freely and positively throughout. Their participation was crucial to the development of this strategy and will continue to be a vital component of implementing it.

The result clearly identifies the need for a close working relationship with the various groups to achieve our desired outcome of reducing the harm from alcohol. Many agencies share our desire to reduce the negative impacts of alcohol use and Westland District Council is committed to providing a safe environment for all residents. This mutually beneficial working approach is what will make this particular strategy evolve and succeed.
