DRAFT ANNUAL PLAN 2020/21 SUBMISSION HEARING

1 SUMMARY

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for Council to hear submissions on the Draft Annual Plan for the financial year ending 30 June 2021.
- 1.2 This issue arises from the requirements of Section 95 of the Local Government Act 2002 (LGA).
- 1.3 Council seeks to meet its obligations under the Local Government Act 2002 and the achievement of the District Vision adopted by Council as part of the Long Term Plan 2018-28. These are stated on Page 2 of this agenda.
- 1.4 This report concludes by recommending that Council hear submissions to the Draft Annual Plan 2020-21, deliberate on the submissions and direct staff to make any changes to the Draft Annual Plan 2020-21.

2 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 S95(1) LGA requires Council to adopt an annual plan for each financial year.
- 2.2 The purpose of an annual plan is to contain the proposed annual budget and funding impact statement for the year to which the annual plan relates [S95(5)(a)] and identify any variation from the financial statements and funding impact statement included in the local authority's long-term plan [LTP] in respect of the year [S95(5)(b)].
- 2.3 An annual plan must contain appropriate references to the long-term plan in which the local authority's activities for the financial year covered by the annual plan are set out [S95(6)(c)].

- 2.4 S95(2) requires Council to undertake public consultation, in accordance with S82, in respect of any significant or material differences between the proposed annual plan and the content of the long-term plan for the financial year to which the annual plan relates.
- 2.5 The content of an annual plan is prescribed by Part 2 of Schedule 10 LGA.

3 CURRENT SITUATION

- 3.1 The Draft Annual Plan 2020/21 corresponds to year 3 of the LTP 2018-28.
- 3.2 Council requested that staff provide a zero-rate increase for the annual plan 2020-21.
- 3.3 Staff have been able to do this, however there will be consequences in the future as the rates revenue will not be sufficient to cover the proposed budget of 1.21%
- 3.4 Due to the COVID-19 situation, Council staff made several adjustments to expenditure to manage the zero-rate increase at the expense of the resources required to carry out Council core functions.
- 3.5 The Draft Annual Plan 2020-21 has been available to the Community for consultation and 129 submission were received. 3 further submissions were received just after the consultation period closed, however due to the COVID-19 situation and the delay in post these were accepted in this instance and are attached as part of the submissions attached as **Appendix 3**.
- 3.6 23 members of the Community have requested to speak at the hearings.

West Coast Wilderness Trail Trust Submission to the Westland District Council Annual Plan

Introduction

The West Coast Wilderness Trail Trust would like to thank the Westland District Council for its previous support of the West Coast Wilderness Trail Trust and request a grant of \$15,000 from this year's Annual Plan. Our Trust believes the requested contribution is a small amount to ask for the time and investment by Trustees and the dedicated professional Trail Manager to undertake the management and marketing of this Council owned asset.

The Wilderness Trail is now one of New Zealand's top trails and a huge community and economic asset. We have seen its popularity to locals for biking, running and walking and this has escalated during the lockdown. We believe the trail can now be considered a recreational asset in the same way rugby fields, netball courts and swimming pools are. It is now embedded in many resident's daily lives. In terms of economic benefit, over 90% of the estimated 7,000 – 10,000 visiting riders have come solely for the purpose of riding the trail and it is widely expected that the trail will be amongst the most popular drawcards to kick-start tourism following the lockdown.

In this submission we would like to outline the role and work of the Trust and the overall operations of the trail.

The West Coast Wilderness Trail Trust and Trail Manager

The Trust comprises five voluntary trustees, Geoff Gabites (Chair), John Wood (Vice Chair and Treasurer), Pauline Cox, Cindy Hopper and Rodger Mills. This is a good mix of people from the two districts and includes operators, riders and guides. Trustees do however perform their roles independent of their own business affiliations.

Jackie Gurden has undertaken a leadership role as Trail Manager under a contract for the last three years. This is pretty much a seven day a week function.

The Trust provides the link working proactively and collaboratively between the riders, businesses, Councils, New Zealand Cycle Trails Inc. It also works with many other key stakeholders including DOC, Trustpower, partner trails (including the Old Ghost Road) and the community. A snapshot of the recent work of the Trust includes:

- Emergency management communications at times of weather events and other trail closures and alerts.
- Management of the requirements of NZCT and MBIE including the Warrants of Fitness, ongoing market research and reporting requirements.
- Inputting into trail upgrade and infrastructure planning.
- Raising the funding and planning to trail enhancements e.g. interpretation panels, shelters and signage.
- Managing the relationship with the 70 Official Partners membership programme.
- Managing the relationships with commercial tour operators in order to obtain agreement on a voluntary 'concession' payment reflecting their commercial use of the trail.
- Managing the regular trail marketing including Facebook, TripAdvisor, updating and distributing the brochure.
- Managing the website.
- Updating the public on the trail through media articles.
- Undertaking our own specific marketing campaigns this year's major shoulder and winter campaign was planned immediately prior to the lockdown so is on hold.
- Preparing the Health and Safety information for riders.
- Encouraging events on the trail and supporting the organisers of these. There are now four annual events held.
- Undertaking the benchmarking and economic assessment reports.
- Inputting into and materialising the Development West Coast's regional cycle trail strategy.

There are also a wide range of other functions and communications managed.

The Positioning and Performance of the Trail

Over the last three years we have taken this trail to be one of the leading performers of the 22 trails within the Nga Haerenga New Zealand Cycle Trails. This is both from a management and a rider experience perspective.

In terms of trail management, we are amongst the most proactive trail entities in the country. We have consistently been at the forefront of strategic planning, market research and marketing of our trail. While topping all trails in the NZCT survey analysis we understand we are also the only trail to co-ordinate collective marketing packages with our member businesses.

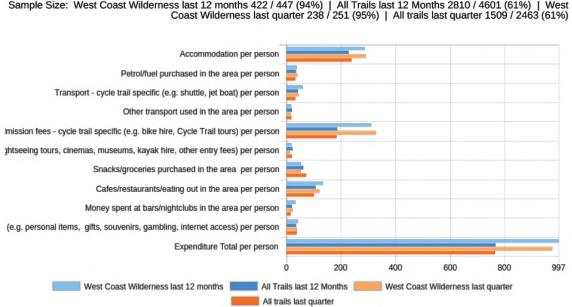
The performance of the trail sits above most other trails in every category benchmarked nationally. This is reflected in the independent trail survey data that is based on the consistent rider surveys undertaken continuously under the NZCT market research programme. Latest results for the last 12 months with 4196 responses from the 22 trails, 413 (10%) from the West Coast Wilderness Trail, show the following results.

The trail is performing exceptionally well showing a strong return to the region of \$8-\$10 million per annum. MBIE use the multiplier of 3.55 for trails. The Wilderness Trail is therefore generating around \$30 million in economic return each year or three times the total cost to construct it. The growth of the trail has triggered considerable private investment (in excess of \$7 million) to support the visitor experience and this is continuing to grow. The trail is amongst the highest performers of the entire 22 New Zealand trails in terms of spend per rider, based on the current New Zealand Cycle Trail research. This shows the Wilderness Trail has a regional economic contribution of \$996 per person, as shown on the graph below, and \$257 per rider per night.

Regional Economic Contribution Per Person (NB: this is the contribution of each trail user visiting the area only/mainly because of the trail)

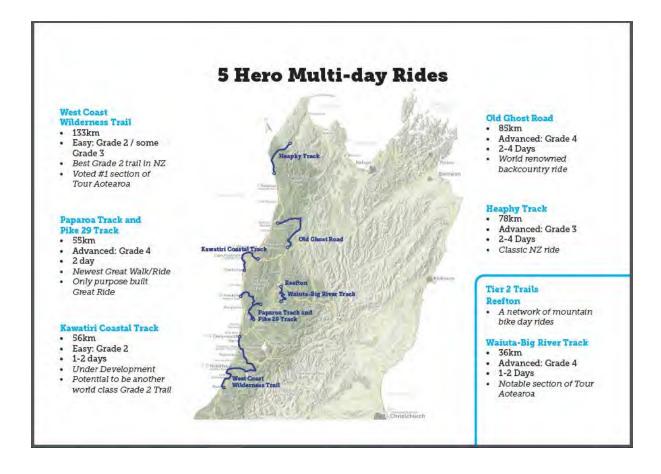

Our trail is not in this position by accident. There is a lot of very hard, dedicated work and passion happening for the trail.

WCWT Trust Role in the Ongoing development of West Coast Cycle Trails

While slightly outside of the direct Trust mandate, we are active participants in the consultation and ongoing development plans for the Coast. Along with the Old Ghost Road, we hold significant intellectual property and knowledge which we bring to the table across a variety of projects. With the regions existing and planned cycle network, we see the huge potential to develop the Coast as a cycle mecca for visitors. This work is for the benefit of the whole Coast, not just the Wilderness Trail. We believe the cycle network collectively will play a significant role in the development of a diversified economic portfolio leading the coast out of the current Covid-19 crisis.



The Financial Position of the Trust

The Trust operates on a budget of around \$100,000 pa. This includes project funding. For its first years the Trust operated on the Westland District Council Economic Stimulus funding coupled with Official Partner members, funding from the Grey District Annual Plan, sponsorships and donations while striving to generate as much income itself as possible. The Stimulus funding is now exhausted. The Trust has worked hard over the last year to generate as much income as possible for its own operations. This now sits at \$33,800. We have 66 OPPs paying \$295 + GST per annum. All main tour companies operating from the trail have agreed to contribute \$10 per rider per day. Some have already been doing this for two years. We have a further company contributing \$3,000 pa and are in discussions with a second for a larger sponsorship. Post Covid-19 we would like to think this level of financial support will continue however there is no certainty this will be retained.

In addition to operational funding, the Trust has also raised over \$40,000 for projects such has interpretation, directional signage, a shelter and a new trail counter.

Conclusion

We believe the Trust is performing to a very high level and that the future demand for the trail and rider numbers are going to continue to be high. Further, that an ongoing strong Trust is important to ensure we realise the value of the trail as part of the wider region's cycle growth. The role undertaken has delivered many management functions that would have normally been required to have been performed by Council staff or additional personal and likely to have been at a cost much higher than that requested.

Baches on Road Reserve - Annual fees

It is that time of year again; sorry about that!

Good news; Westland District Council is not increasing the annual fee covering the Licence to Occupy your bach site this coming financial year 1 July-2013-30 June 2014.

Separately, as you know we currently also invoice many bach site owners, on behalf of the West Coast Regional Council, for regional rates then send the funds to regional council. Other bach site owners pay their regional council rates separately. It is a bit cumbersome.

To simplify things, we propose from 1 July 2013 that we combine our annual fee together with regional council rates fee in one invoice so that you pay us one amount, and we will cover all the regional council rates and associated administrative costs.

Bach sites are generally about the same size and regional council rates generally about the same amount, so we averaged the total rate bill and divided by our 66 baches, plus a bit towards admin charges in shuffling the paperwork. We came up with \$50 per year per bach.

Attached is your invoice for \$2,050.00, covering all fees for the coming financial year.

Westland District Council Policy Baches and Other Occupations on Unformed Legal Road

Council recognises that baches have a unique place in the history of Westland. As a matter of policy, Westland District Council accepts the continued use of baches for recreational purposes. As well, other occupations exist on unformed legal road that require policy direction to acknowledge their existence, subject to the following conditions:

- i) On behalf of Council, WDPL manages unformed legal roads in Westland.
- ii) Council retains the responsibility for any decisions made relating to the management of unformed legal roads.
- iii) All holders of baches and other occupations must have a WDPL Licence to Occupy Unformed Legal Road and must comply with the conditions of that License to Occupy. A fee is payable.
- iv) Baches and other occupations must not interfere with the public right to pass and re-pass along the unformed legal road. Buildings must be ultimately relocatable.
- v) Holders of a Licence to Occupy are responsible for obtaining all necessary resource consents and building consents.
- vi) Baches on existing sites with footprint less than 100sqm may increase their footprint up to 100sqm; however baches on existing sites with footprint greater than 100sqm may not increase their footprint. Baches on new sites must not exceed 100sqm footprint.
- vii) For clarity, WDPL and Council management reserves the right to classify an occupation as a bach and associated structures (subject to 100sqm maximum footprint) or any other associated structure (maximum area to be set in case-by-case basis) on 1 site. This will be determined at the time of the application.
- viii) Council, upon recommendation from WDPL, will set the scale of licence fees for baches and other occupations on unformed legal road as part of its Annual Plan. Distribution of Licence fees will be 75% WDPL, 25% Council.
- ix) This policy will be reviewed in line with the Long Term Plan every three years; beginning with the 2018-19 Long Term Plan.

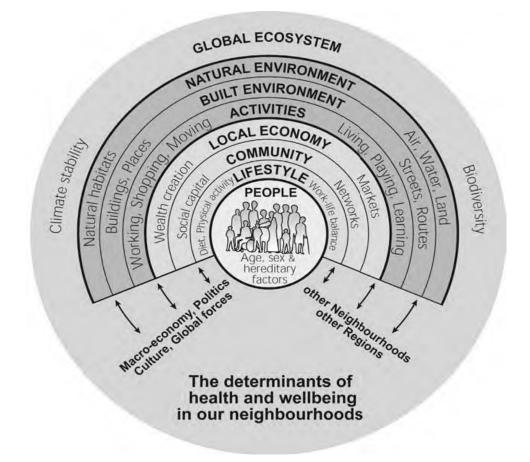
Introduction

Community and Public Health West Coast is a regional office of the Community and Public Health Division, Canterbury District Health Board and provides a regional public health service to the West Coast. We welcome the opportunity to comment on the Westland District Council's Draft Annual Plan 2020-2021.

The goal of our organisation is that of improving and protecting the health and well-being of the people of the West Coast. However, while health care services are an important determinant of health, health is also influenced by a wide range of factors beyond the health sector.

The Dahlgren and Whitehead 1991 model below illustrates how individuals are influenced by factors that generally lie outside their control. These factors; often referred to as the social determinants of health and well-being, can be described as the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age; they are affected by environmental, social and behavioural factors.

As depicted in the diagram, the sphere of influence is very wide; furthermore changes in any of these areas can affect health and wellbeing dramatically (both positively and negatively). In order to maximise people's wellbeing, these factors need to be taken into account by policy and decision makers including Councils.



Another way to incorporate wellbeing into Council's decision making and planning is to use the 5 Ways to Wellbeing developed by the New Economics Foundation in 2008. The five ways are a set of evidencebased public health messages aimed at improving the mental health and general wellbeing of the whole population.



The Sovereign Wellbeing Index project found that the five **Ways to Wellbeing** were all strongly associated with higher wellbeing. People experienced higher levels of wellbeing when they:

- were connected socially with others (Connect)
- gave time and resources to others (Give)
- were able to appreciate and take notice of things around them (Take notice)
- were learning new things in their lives (Keep learning)
- were physically active (Be Active)

These five ways are being used by councils in the UK to build stronger communities:

'It is conscious planning in a way that will actually promote wellbeing. If we have wellbeing in mind at the point of planning we have a better chance of building resilience in communities to enable them to survive in difficult times.' (Ashton, Leigh and Wigan PCT in the Five ways to wellbeing, New application, new ways of thinking 2011) p.30

Investing in wellbeing benefits more than just the individual. For example people who report higher levels of wellbeing tend to be more involved in social and civic life, are more likely to behave in environmentally responsible ways, have better family and social relationships at home and are more productive at work. I may be young, but I have taken the time to look into the possible alternatives and write to you. I would appreciate it if you listened to what I (as the youth of our town) have to say.

Our ocean is a fragile thing and something that needs to be protected. We are a tourist-based town. How do you think said tourists will react when they find out we are intentionally ruining our environment?

This isn't a case of some ill-advised teenager complaining about a problem without giving a solution. There IS a solution. It's called Wetlands. I'll trust you know what I'm talking about, considering you've looked into all the possible alternatives, so I'll skip the details and tell you what I think.

Making the decision to install Wetlands would be a good community decision for a number of reasons.

The foremost thing you seem concerned about is economic development and wealth, so I'll hit those things first. After the initial construction, this operation would be a fairly low budget, considering the plants do the work for us. We would quite happily be able to leave it be, and go pursue other issues without fear of something going wrong (i.e. a pipe leak 20 metres offshore).

This could also be made into a tourist destination and a way of promoting our town. We could become known as the self-sustainable and environmentally responsible town. 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Submission of the West Coast Farm Forestry Association In support of restoring FULL ANNUAL FUNDING TO THE REGENT THEATRE (Westland Community Centre)

The West Coast Farm Forestry Association, like many other West Coast Community Groups relies on facilities such as the Regent Theatre to help bring Activity and People to the region and district.

After 2 successful large national Annual Farm Forestry Conferences in Greymouth, in 2016 we decided to bring the National Farm Forestry Conference to Hokitika (where many of us forest owners now live and pay rates). This was approved by the executive because we could show in the Regent and Town that we had quality facilities available.

The April 2016 Farm Forestry Conference was a Roaring Success (NZ wide members keep telling what a wonderful place Hokitika and the West Coast are, and I am sure as a result return privately often). We had a full 6 days in town of Formal Conference, with over 200 persons attending. With the conference fee of \$500 that was over \$100,000 spent in the town and surrounds. Additionally we had almost all available accommodation booked out, and at say \$100 a night that would be another \$20,000 plus probably lots of tourist spend and private meals.

This was possible because of the facilities and technical support available from local staff. Damien O'Connor gave an impressive West Coast Speech. There were several rooms in the theatre for the 6 Action Group Meetings. Many guest speakers came from away. Rather than put on traditional morning and afternoon teas on the 3 venue days, we produced a map of all the cafes they could go to for more enjoyable spend and social time (believe it or not we had 6 days of pure sunny weather – rained day they went home).

On the 3 field days we ventured far and wide locally, to Ross and South Westland, to local properties, to Shantytown and Reefton, so supporting all West Coast Districts. We also used the Boys Brigade Hall on 2 full meal occasions, supporting local supermarkets and bakeries for provided lunches. 3 buses of people were in town for the whole 6 days.

Since then we have also run in the Regent a day long West Coast Farm Forestry Seminar, because all the facilities are readily on hand. Submission is for an increase to the Annual Site Fee for Baches on Unformed Legal Road. Current fee is \$2,050.00, proposed fee is \$2,255.00 – being a 10% increase in fee.

The reason for the increase is due to Westland District Council charging rates on Road Reserve from 1 July 2020. This has come about due to a review of Rating base information of the Westland District Council that highlighted that Westland District Council has not been charging rates on all land that it is legally entitled to.

Up till now, WDC has charged Destination Westland Ltd (managers of unformed Legal Road) a lease-in-lieu of rates on sites. With this change to the rating base information, rates charged will be higher than the previous lease-in-lieu of rates and therefore the increase is required.

There has not been an increase in the Annual Site Fee for over 10 years. While this increase is not best timed due to the current climate, it is necessary for Destination Westland to pass this increase on to the Licence Holders.

The 2019/20 plan said this about the Theatre:

"Additional Funding for Hokitika Regent Theatre. The grant for Hokitika Regent Theatre will be increased to assist the board with building and maintenance costs. The Theatre faces a number of financial risks and Council provides operational grant funding to assist them to reduce these risks."

In our submission and presentation to the 2019 annual plan, we made it clear to Council that this increased level of grant would need to be continued in future years for the Theatre to continue to provide its service to the community.

The increase in the annual grant to \$57,500 enabled us to fully insure the building for the first time and to be sufficiently funded to ensure the continuity of service. The increase had huge support with over 100 submissions from organisations and individuals, and was unanimously supported by Councillors.



The Regent is Hokitika's only cinema, big performance and events centre, town hall, and is an important heritage building. It is used by over 40 community groups and has over 25,000 visits per year. On a population basis this is an average of over 7 visits for each person in Hokitika. There can not be many community theatres/ town halls in the country that achieve this ratio.

When operating "normally", the theatre provides full and part time jobs for about 14 people, and we give priority to local businesses for our work. An economic impact study several years ago showed the theatre provides annual benefits of over \$2million to the local community. Without continuation of at least this level of support there is every likelihood the Theatre will not survive the present crisis brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic. The position is explained further below:

Tracking to plan until Covid 19.

Until Covid 19 the Theatre's budget had been tracking to plan thanks to Council's increase to \$57,500 and our own efforts to increase revenue and decrease costs. We had even, for the first time, been able to set aside \$1000 per month to build a contingency reserve for replacement and major maintenance of equipment.

Assuming the Council's annual grant would continue or be increased by the CPI.

We had assumed the \$57,500 grant would continue into this year's Annual Plan and the main discussion would be about adding an annual CPI adjustment to help with cost increases that were outside our control.

A quadruple whammy from Covid 19.

The Covid 19 situation has now delivered us a multiple whammy and turned a healthy situation into a potentially disastrous one:

- the contribution from international visitors to our income has ceased for the year (this is normally a useful "top up" for our budget;
- we were required to close for two months and while we now have a partial reopening, there is
 a limit to the numbers of local and domestic visitors who will come to the movies until new
 mainstream films are released later in the year;
- we face a drop in our grant from Council from \$57,500 to \$30,000;
- our Cafe operator is not continuing her contract, leaving a major hole in our rent stream at a time it will be hard to find a replacement.

We are only surviving at present thanks to the Government's Wage Subsidy.

We have prepared a Profit and Loss (P&L) projection to model the Covid 19 impacts and our crisis management strategy.

We have factored in actuals up until the end of May and projected figures for the remainder of the year to the end of December, based on either known figures or informed judgement.

We have purged costs line by line and looked for increased revenue. However we have very limited scope to cut costs while maintaining a service to the community.

Normally the movies and rents sides of our operation subsidises the community events side but this year that is not going to happen. We already run on the "smell of an oily rag": for example our paid staff keep the Theatre running 7 days a week 12 hours a day in normal times on a total wages bill of just over \$100,000.

Huge community support already keeps the rates contribution to the Theatre at a minimum.

Keeping the operation going is made possible only with huge support from community volunteers (7000 hours plus last year), local sponsorship and grants for capital items. The Council grant is crucial for operations though, we just don't have "fat" in the system to survive without it. Hokitika's Theatre runs on far less ratepayer support than those in Grey and Buller where neither council is cutting their grants this year. It also gets only a fraction of what other important community services owned directly by our Council get: for example the Library, Swimming Pool, Museum and Parks. Keeping the Theatre's grant at its present level would take only 1.8% of the Hokitika Community Rate.

Many of our costs are fixed and will keep rolling on, whatever level of operation we are at. Last year with Council support we increased our insurance to give full replacement earthquake cover. This helps protect a debt free community asset worth at least \$4 million to replace.

The figures assume a continued improvement in the Covid 19 situation. Once we get to next January, we expect a more "normal" operation of the Theatre with domestic tourists replacing in part the icing-on-the-cake visitors bring to our budget.

We have run P&L scenarios with the Council grant at \$30,000 and \$57,000. Without restoration of our grant to the full amount our contingency reserve will be entirely gone by December. If we return to a more "normal" year for the first half of 2021 with a \$57,500 grant and a good summer our operational bank balance will be \$48,000 by mid year which is as low as we would want to be. The \$30,000 grant scenario would have our bank account at just \$20,000, which is probably too low to be survivable.

This Covid-19 year is putting stress on many. Losing the Theatre would just add to this.

We appreciate what a difficult time this is now for many in our community; our committee members have their own business and jobs under stress - so we don't lightly ask for a continuation of our present funding level. If the Theatre has to close, just one trip per year to Greymouth to go to the movies or a show would cost families more than what they pay in rates to keep Hokitika's Regent going.

Conclusion.

The Draft Annual Plan says that while Council is committed to a rates freeze it does not intend to reduce any levels of service. The plan also says: "Council recognises that rates must be kept affordable but also assist in stimulating growth as a key stakeholder during the recovery period." But by halving its grant to the Theatre the level of service and stimulus provided to the community will be drastically affected.

We ask Council to fund Hokitika's Regent Theatre at \$57,500 for this year.

Continuation of full funding support will help us to continue covering costs such as earthquake insurance, rates, compliance and maintenance expenses for the building, fire and sprinkler, heating and ventilation systems and maintenance of expensive equipment. It will allow the Theatre to remain as an important part of the Hokitika and wider Westland community. The benefits that the Theatre provides will be especially important for us all over the coming months.

Te Runanga o Makaawhio are unequivocally opposed to the discharge of human sewage treated wastewater to Te Tai o Poutini - The Tasman Sea or any other water body, as we firmly regard such practices as culturally offensive and environmentally unsound in the first instance.

The degradation of waterways as a result of discharges is a significant issue for Poutini Ngai Tahu, and we note with concern the consent issued to Westland Milk Products - bypassing public submissions and notification - regarding the disposal of treated wastewater to the proposed ocean outfall and into the marine environment.

As such, we are opposed to any initiative by Westland District Council to utilise, in any joint exercise/agreement with Westland Milk Products, the ocean outfall, to dispose of human sewage treated wastewater.

Te Runanga o Makaawhio propose that the Westland District Council give full consideration to a transitional closure of the eyesore at the current coastal management sewage operation on State Highway 6 at Three Mile, and procure a suitable wetland environment to discharge human sewage treated wastewater to land, as an environmentally responsible alternative to offensive "third-world behaviour" solutions in a first-world location and community.

This approach is consistent with Treaty of Waitangi principles and the development of concepts and technology that address cultural and spiritual matters of paramount importance to tangata whenua, and in consideration to all Westlanders and future generations.

We request the council make adequate provision for a modern and environmentally sound alternative following robust community consultation.

DWC Westland Sports Hub - Funding Request - Annual Plan 20/21

Further to our recent correspondence, the DWC Westland Sports Hub User Group requests a grant of \$78,616.56 +GST to meet the unforeseen costs of the project. We ask that Council consider this request and allow for it within their 2020-21 Annual Plan.

The project has been well governed and managed, however, a number of unforeseen costs have occurred. Many of these have been additional requirements to meet the requirements of the Building Consent, as required by Council. These are listed in the table below.

The DWC Westland Sports Hub User Group has undertaken a huge body of work for three years assisting with both the gymnasium and covered complexes. This has included fundraising over \$200,000 from the community, securing \$745,000 from Westland High School and Ministry of Education. There has also been a significant contribution of volunteer time to overseeing the planning and construction of the facility. This has all been undertaken on a voluntary basis.

Also supporting this request is the fact that, in many other districts, Councils are fully responsible for capital and operating costs of sports halls and other recreation and community facilities. In our community this facility is being managed and maintained by the school, sports groups and community thus removing this function from the Council.

Further, this project is utilised by most sporting codes in addition to the school. In addition to use by 350 school students, up to 1000 other people will use the facilities in winter. Supporting this project is therefore providing reach and benefit back to a large sector of the ratepaying community.

I am writing regarding an annual plan submission and budget bid for \$5,000 to assist with delivery of the New Zealand Chinese Language Week (NZCLW) being held across New Zealand 20-26th September 2020. We acknowledge this may be a late submission and appreciate your consideration of our request.

Background

Hi Simon

The Fox Glacier Management Committee met last night and agreed that, due to Covid-19 challenges, the time was not right for a rate increase. A motion was passed to withdraw the Fox Inc part of the request to increase the Fox Glacier Community rate for 2020/21. Once the minutes of the meeting are confirmed I will send them to you so you have a copy of that motion.

The Management Committee has asked me to stress to you that we need the historical grants of \$26,000 for the CDO, and \$35,000 for the TDF to remain on the books for us for 2020/21. Fox Inc simply cannot operate without those sources of funding. The CDO funding has traditionally come from the \$65,000 Glacier Promotion Rate and is divided into \$26,000 for Fox, \$26,000 for Franz and \$13,000 to Glacier Country Tourism Group. This has been the "catch and allotment" since probably the late 1990's. Your reply to our initial letter to you and Lesley in mid December 2019 suggested that Council is applying a different, and in our view incorrect, distribution of that rate.

Kathy Hartshorne will be responding to you for the Franz Josef community. She and Ian are helping Ian's mum with medical treatment in Rangiora at the moment. She hopes to get to you asap.

The Committee has also asked that, as soon as is practical, a means is found to put to bed once and for all, the idea that the targeted rate takes in Fox and Franz over the last 20 or so years have not been reflected in the amount paid to our communities in that period. This is despite significant growth in both of our communities but particularly in Franz. We would like a review of the Glacier Promotion Rate and the Town Development Fund since each began. We do not think that our communities should pay the cost for such an investigation. We feel transparency in our rate collection and spend is a reasonable request.

Ultimately our CDO rate will need to increase as we will have to rob Peter to pay Paul this year. We look forward to working with you and Lesley as we see how our communities' finances fare in the Covid recovery world and we work together for their benefit.

The consent for the WMP pipe specifically states that it must not contain human sewage. So it is naive of WDC to think that they will be granted consent easily to share this pipeline. That condition is in the consent for good reason.
